We presently have 26 clubs in our District and I've visited 8 clubs with 6 others scheduled. Remaining Clubs, please respond to Lion Suzette, my administrative assistant, who is scheduling my visitations with you.

Please allow me to share some successes and opportunities from LCI, and let it be known that LCI and the District need your assistance.

Successes

Constitutional Area 1 (US, Bermuda, and Bahamas) has cut net membership loss in half, as compared to this time last year. Today we are only -409. That is an improvement of 417.

Your focus on Membership Satisfaction has resulted in a 16% decrease in members dropped as compared to this time last year.

Struaales

MyLion was a struggle. However, LCI staff worked diligently to enhance the service reporting platform. Therefore, it is now possible for clubs to report their service going back to July 1, 2019.

Chartering of new clubs is a struggle. We are behind as compared to last year. Further, we are not meeting the total clubs pledged by my class of Governors. The dreaded December Drops are lurking around the corner.

The Global Action Team is ready to assist you and we need your assistance:

- 1. Please consider sponsoring at least one new member in the next 45 days.
- 2. Enter at least one service activity in MyLion. Please report any problems that need to be addressed.

Dear Lions,

- 1. We all know the challenges our District has faced in providing District Officers. I spoke to a few Lions regarding our 1st and 2nd Vice District Governor positions. Lion James Katzaman, a highly motivated and dedicated Lion, has agreed to accept an appointment of Acting 1st Vice District Governor, to proceed through the chairs, and he gets the full support of his club to do so.
- 2. Pursuant to District 22-A Constitution and By-Laws, Section 8, I am appointing Lion James Katzaman to the position of Acting 1st Vice District Governor for District 22-A effective December 1, 2019.
- 3. This Lion will serve as Acting 1st Vice District Governor until another 1st Vice District Governor has been elected in a special election or until the start of the term of the Vice District Governor has been elected at the annual election at the District Convention.
- 4. Lion James Katzaman is a member of the Linthicum Lions Club. LCI records show that Lion James Katzaman meets the qualifications for appointment.
- I've had extensive conversations over the past weeks with LCI and PDG John Andrews (Constitution and By-Laws Chair) and we have agreed that under our District 22-A Constitution and By-Laws, we will hold a special election for the position in January 2020.
- 6. Candidates for Vice District Governor in this special election shall submit their intention to run along with their qualifications to the Nomination Committee within thirty (30) days of the notification to the club that a vacancy in the office exists.

LIONS VISION RESEARCH FOUNDATION

If you missed the LVRF rally on November 16, you missed an excellent event. The morning began with coffee, pastries, and socializing followed by stimulating presentations. Dr. McDonnell, Director of Wilmer Eye Institute, spoke on the State of the Institute and Lions Low Vision Center (LVC) chief, Dr. Judy Goldstein, gave an update on the fellowship program. Assistant Professor Ashley Deemer (previously a fellowship recipient) spoke on the latest research being conducted at Wilmer. We were also introduced to the current fellow, Dr. Micaela Gobeille. It goes without saying, the patient testimonial of Thomas Lenhart left no doubt in anyone's mind as to the life-changing services provided by the Lions LVC.

A highpoint of the program was the Fireside Chat with former Senator Barbara Mikulski. Senator Mikulski lavished praised on the efforts of the MD22 Lions and the cooperative relationship between Wilmer and the Lions. She reminisced on her friendship with the esteemed Dr. Patz and provided a little history on his role in bringing Lions and Wilmer together. (Dr. Patz's family was also in attendance.)

In keeping with the theme of the program, "Summit for Sight" PDG John Shwed donned his mountain-climbing gear to present an overview of the LVRF. Club and personal donations were presented resulting in \$44,352.40 for LVRF to be used for operating funds, the Fellowship Endowment and associated programs.

LVRF Chair Larry Burton reminded the Lions of his three goals for LVRF.

- 1. To raise \$100,000 by the end of the Lions year for the endowment
- 2. To submit at least one grant for funding
- 3. To obtain donations from 100% of all clubs in MD22

The LVRF Trustees realize how far funds are stretched in some of the smaller clubs; however, a show of 100% support by the clubs in MD22 goes a long way in impressing grantors. As we near the halfway point in the Lions Year, LVRF Trustees will be contacting those clubs who have not yet donated to solicit their support. Your club's

donation, no matter how small, goes a long way in helping LVRF achieve its goals.



September, 2018 - Club recruitment was completed this year under the umbrella of a school-wide leadership team. Students completed a form that represented their choice for preferred club participation.

October, 2018 - Club leadership skills were developed through election of Club officers and discussion of projects to be undertaken during the year.

November, 2018 - Developed a format for first project - "Literature Lock-in" and Book drive. Prepared promotional materials for both efforts.

January/February, 2019 - Held "Book Drive."

Collected/sorted/boxed over 3,000 books and distributed as follows:

- o 1923 books to Highlandtown Elementary School in Baltimore City
- o 415 books to Oakland Mills Middle School
- 758 books divided between the reading program at Wilde Lake High School and the Glenwood Senior Center.

March 8, 2019 - Held "Literature Lock-in"

- · Adult help
 - Glenwood Public library's young adult librarian, Lori Conforti
 - o Our school librarian, Courtnay Moore
 - o One additional teacher, Lisa Scepura.
- 89 readers attended the event, almost twice the attendance of the past year.

 A donation of \$182 was also made to both the Howard County Library's Adult Literacy Program and to Small Miracles for a total of \$364

April/May, 2019 - Bike Drive

- Planned and completed promotional activities including social media, morning TV announcements, posters and word of mouth
- May 6- We prepared bikes for pick up removed peddles, adjusted handle bars and seats for 63 bikes and collected \$110. Will reevaluate the effectiveness of this effort considering the donation system at the landfill for next year.

June 2019

- Assisted Bushy Park Elementary School LEO's with the coordination of the Year-End Celebration (Ice Cream party) to be held at their school.
- Prepared to make presentations on June 13th to Bushy Park ES LEO's, summarizing our Club's activities for the past school year.

For the year- Leo Club member, Riley Suszkiw, was nominated for "Leo of the Year" recognition.

Saturday, May 4th the Glenwood Middle School LEO Club held their annual "Bike Drive." Approximately 12 club members participated – assisted by the Club's advisor, Lion Mary Powers, her husband, several members of the Glenwood Club (Pete Adams, Gloria Nutzhorn and Harrison Morson) and several parents of student club members. Also on board were representatives from "Bikes for the World," the non-profit organization with whom our LEO Club partners for this project.

2019 represents the 10th year that the LEO Club has sponsored the "Bike Drive" project. The May 4th event resulted in the collection of **66** bicycles accompanied by parental cash donations of \$100. Lions Passion to tour Yuengling Brewery



SRLC arrived on time for their 10:30 am tour. Pottsville Lion and IPP Charlene Hertog greeted our group at the Brewery, walked the tour with us and Lion Debbie (Yuengling Marketing employee and former Pottsville Lions President) gave the Tour.

During the tour Severn River Lions Ashley Sanford, Jim Coolbaugh, Chuck Horne, Clem Kusiak, Jeanne Kusiak, Tom Violette and Paul Nelson witnessed firsthand how brewing begins within heated brew tanks, filling of kegs, hand dug caves through solid rock in the side of a mountain where storage of beer was made possible due to the constant temperature of 50 degrees.
