

Lions Clubs International & Diabetes Awareness

Diabetes has a large effect on our communities. An estimated 463 million adults across the world live with diabetes and its prevalence is increasing rapidly. By 2045, the number is expected to reach 700 million. Research has found that the rate of people being diagnosed with prediabetes and diabetes has been rising across the globe for many years. Diabetes is a global epidemic that touches every corner of the globe. Lions and Lions Clubs are working to reduce the prevalence of diabetes and improve the lives of those living with type II diabetes.



DIABETES IN MARYLAND According to the Maryland Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System

- 10.5 % of Maryland adults have diabetes
- 34% of Maryland adults have prediabetes (approximately 1.6 million people)

Risk factors for diabetes include:

- Being overweight or obese
- Age (risk increases as age increases)
- Race or ethnicity
- Poor nutrition and lack of physical activity
- Tobacco use
- Prediabetes and gestational diabetes
- * Social determinants such as income and education level

Diabetes Awareness Ribbons allow Lions to become active in reducing the cause and raising awareness of diabetes. By raising small donations and handing out this small ribbon we hope to bring awareness to those with diabetes.

Diabetes Awareness Ribbons raise funds to help by sending kids to diabetes camps, providing literature for coping with diabetes, cookbooks, diet planning, and literature.

All of the funds raised with Diabetes Awareness Ribbons will go toward diabetes awareness and helping those with diabetes. That's the Lions' commitment.

ONE MAN'S ROAD TO HEALTH



It's a 12-minute drive from Len Dompke's suburban Chicago home to Edward-Elmhurst Hospital. Straight down York Road, four quick stop lights, and a sharp right into the parking lot. Traffic-wise, it's easy. Yet, the first time Dompke made the drive, it was one of the hardest of his life... a ride straight into tough stuff. Like soul-searching, breaking decades-old bad

habits, adopting healthier ones. Dompke — a 60-something husband, father, grandfather, friend — knew if something didn't change, he'd become one of the 400 million people worldwide living with diabetes. It was time to get healthy. Forever.

With a US\$95,000 grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), Lions partnered with Edward-Elmhurst to develop *Jumpstart Your Health*, a program providing education and resources to low-income adults at risk of developing diabetes. Lions, backed by LCIF and Edward-Elmhurst health

professionals, are trained as ambassadors who can advocate for diabetes prevention and facilitate Jumpstart meetings. It's a classic example of Lions doing what they do best — serve!


Dompke, who had tried, unsuccessfully, to become healthier on his own, made the drive to Edward-Elmhurst each week for a year, finding Jumpstart, LCIF, and Lions to be the lifelines he needed to become educated, stronger, 80 pounds lighter, and no longer at risk of diabetes. "Thank you, Lions!" said Dompke. "I want everyone to know how much good you're doing for communities every single day."






LIONS CLUB of BALTIMORE NEPALESE HIGHLIGHTS continued

DARLINGTON LIONS CLUB HIGHLIGHTS



Ther Darlington Lions have been living the 'We Serve' mantra while undertaking a number of service activities this fall. In September, club members staffed a rest stop for cyclists participating in a fundraiser for the Fisher House, a program that provides lodging for veterans receiving VA medical services. In addition to water, the club purchased bananas, granola bars, oranges, and the necessities to make peanut & butter sandwiches for the riders. A total of 56 cyclists stopped by to recharge themselves, 24 miles into their rides. We received many thanks from an appreciative group of participants.

In October, the club undertook the semi-annual clean-up of its adopted road. A 2 ½ mile stretch was scoured and items were sorted as trash or recyclable materials. The recyclable items were fully broken down to remove all aluminum beverage cans for deposit on the club's aluminum can trailer. That haul of cans was added to those donated by the community and helped us reach our typical 100-lb of aluminum per month to be turned in.

In November, club members assisted with set-up, serving, and clean-up for the Silver Lunch Bunch gathering in Darlington. The group of more than 50 persons consists of area senior citizens and individuals who participate as drivers in the Getting There Ride Share program that operates in northern Harford and Western Cecil Counties.

And the service activities are really heating up as we move towards the holidays. The Sunday after Thanksgiving, the club will host a holiday display lighting ceremony on Main Street with members of the community joining us for some caroling, cookies, and cider. Then in December, the club will be manning the Lions Train Garden at Broom's Bloom in Bel Air, Dec 8-10. Finally, just prior to Christmas, the club will conduct its Christmas Food Basket and Toy Store distribution program for the 25-30 area families that is will adopt. This continues a club project that has at least a 60-year history!

Harrison Morson was hands down one of the top supporters of Bikes for the World. His connections to Bikes for the World go deep. He was a member of the Glenwood Lions Club. Through the Lions' activity he also worked with us through Bushy Park Elementary and Glenwood Middle School. He was instrumental in getting the wheels turning at Alpha Ridge Landfill and recruiting Lions to help organize the site. He also worked with WalMart to have bikes delivered to the school collections to keep the student volunteers active and busy during the collections.

Harrison worked with the local media to always get the collections mentioned in the newspaper before and after the events. He knew the value of advertising the event but also in rewarding those individuals who worked hard to pull it off. And he always gave credit where credit was due. In fact, years ago we tried to mention Harrison as the featured volunteer of the month, but he pushed the recognition toward other Lions like Larry Orwig or the club as a whole.

Harrison was also responsible for pushing for funding for our efforts. Back when the Lions Club was more involved at Glenwood Middle School, Larry and Harrison would personally transport bikes from the landfill and Race Pace Bicycles to help bring more bikes to the school on collection day. This also helped us tremendously with transportation at a time when we were based in south Arlington. While the school didn't solicit many financial donations from donors during the collection. Lion Harrison ensured that the Lions Club funded the project. Between personal contributions from Harrison and the Club's Giant (literally) checks, he brought more than \$10,000 in support of the efforts in Glenwood.

We had hoped to honor Harrison when the Alpha Ridge collection site hit 10,000 bikes, something he kept track of diligently when he was out at the site. He would regularly bug Bob and Jonathan for updates via text. We could tell the last few years were tough on Lion Harrison. We were still shocked to learn that we lost Harrison earlier this year. Just five years ago he was still pulling bikes out of vans and working hard among kids who could have called him Great Grandpa. When we talked on the phone the last few years, this is what excited Harrison most. Learning that the bikes collected at Alpha Ridge were what pulled us through the pandemic when collections were down and especially that those bikes are what keep our youth programs in the warehouse rolling today made Harrison proud. We know he has done a lot for and with the Glenwood Lions, but his work with BfW is definitely his legacy.

Harrison, if you are still keeping tabs, Alpha Ridge holds at **9,674 bikes** as of 9/1/2023. We will be celebrating that 10k mark as we celebrate BfW's 20th anniversary next year. In fact, as we entered into 2023 the effort that Harrison created in Glenwood, including the schools and recycling center, had already hit that milestone. Harrison's legacy with BfW is actually currently at **11,261 bikes**...and counting.

VISION SCREENING @ IGLESIAS CHURCH in ANNAPOLIS



In October, 86 seniors were screened for Vision Acuity, Spot, Glaucoma, and Hearing. Results of the screenings: 36 referrals requiring eye and hearing professional assistance.

Iglesia Church contact, Sarai Hernandez, arranged for the seniors to be screened by calling, e-mailing, then developing, a spreadsheet reflecting appointment times. There were also four translators on hand to assist at various stations. Mrs. Hernandez volunteered to continue assisting the seniors needing professional assistance through LASH, Lions Community Outreach Foundation (from District 22-C), and Lions Clubs identified by the senior's place of residence.

Iglesia Church Assistant Pastor Nelson graciously provided three elementary school classrooms for each screening. Screening stations consisted of two for Hearing, three for Vision, and one for Glaucoma. Registration and Referrals tables in the lobby allowed for seniors and their families to receive a hearty welcome by Lions. Lion Volunteers from Annapolis, Ellicott City-Columbia, Linthicum, Severn River Clubs; Lash, LCOF, and Neighboring Clubs totaled eighteen (18).

Each with their previous specialty experiences doing health screening.

An estimated 600 children will be vision and hearing screened in Nov/Dec 2023. 8 Nov 23: Screening at Monsignor Slade Catholic Elementary/Middle School. (Completed) 5 Dec 23: Screening at School of the Incarnation Catholic School. (Completed) 12 Dec 23: Screening at St. Mary's Catholic School.

Lots of vision and hearing screening training - With all the requests for screening, LASH is planning to visit clubs to train members how to use the screening equipment, so when a screening request comes in one or more club servicing areas, LASH can provide the equipment for the clubs to operate.

At the 14 Oct 23 LASH Eyeglasses Sorting event, LASH trained attendees from 10 clubs/25 people on how to operate the SPOT vision screener and MAICO MA-1 hearing screener.

The next semiannual Eyeglasses Sorting event will be at the Maryland School for the Blind on 13 Apr 24.
