One of the benefits about being 2VDG is that clubs send copies of their newsletters detailing their various service activities. Getting this info from a number of clubs starts to provide a sense of the difference Lions in District 22-A are making. Road clean-ups are taking place, trees are being planted, and children are being given eye and hearing screenings.

In addition, there are numerous efforts dedicated to fundraising where it can be somewhat more difficult to see the tangible impact. However, at the recent Cabinet Meeting, a presentation by Mark Althoff, the Director of Development for the Maryland School for the Blind and new member of the Bel Air Lions Club, helped capture some of the impact of Lions fundraising. Lion Mark did some cursory research in a spotty database and identified over \$400,000 donated by more than 100 Lions clubs across the multiple district over the past 60 years. Based on the discussion among those in attendance, the dollar amount is likely even greater. Similarly, on Nov 2, LVRF held a Lions Day at the Wilmer Institute to thank Lions for their contributions towards the establishment of the Low Vision Center at Johns Hopkins.

So while you are selling fruit and Christmas trees or serving up spaghetti or chicken dinners, take a moment to consider where that money is ultimately going and the folks that it will be helping. And know that this Thanksgiving, we should all be thankful for what gets done by Lions in District 22-A.

November 14 is Diabetes Day, and with it comes a reminder to all of us to choose healthy foods and exercise regularly. Walking is wonderful exercise and with the fall foliage all around we can take advantage of the beautiful scenery. A neighbor of mine who was insulin dependent started walking and eating better, lost many pounds and no longer has the disease. So grab your dog or a loved one and start today!

As Lions Clubs there is much we can do to help our individual communities to be aware of the dangers of diabetes and to overcome it. At the first cabinet meeting, I provided STRIDES folders to each club present and have mailed flyers to the others. Everything needed to start a walk is included. You can start small with just a walk around the park with your club and family members, or partner with other clubs in your area to do something larger. In the Harford County area, we have made arrangements to have a spring walk on the Ma and Pa Trail and will be inviting all the clubs in the District to join us.

If you would like to do something on a smaller scale, partner with your local hospital to see what their needs are. I have been in contact with the University of MD Hospital in Baltimore and Upper Chesapeake Hospital in Harford County. Both have requested "goodie bags" holding sugar-free candy, oatmeal, pedometers, etc. to give out to patients. This is also a way to promote your club. In Bel Air, we have made up bags with pedometers, encouragement bracelets saying "Go For It" on the front and

"Bel Air Lions Club" on the back. We included a Diabetes Awareness brochure from Lions Clubs International about a healthy lifestyle as well as a business card with information about our club. We hope also to give these out at a local Health Fair.

Many clubs are able to donate to Camp Possibilities or Camp Merrick for diabetic children or to Camp Destiny for teens and young adults. You could sponsor one or more needy child.

As you can see, there are a variety of ways you can help your community become more aware of diabetes, especially at this time when obesity is becoming such an issue. Each club can strive to do one new thing this year to make a difference. I would love to know what you have planned and am happy

LIONS — WHAT YOU DO IS IMPORTANT AND APPRECIATED!!

From Jane Gevecker-Mello, Aberdeen Lions webmaster: The email below came to the Aberdeen Lions e-mailbox via our Lions Club's web site. I'm not sure if it was the Aberdeen Lions who interacted with Robin or if she just happened to find our web site & email address thru a google search. Lions definitely made a difference to two people that week.

While at the Maryland State Fair this year my husband and I passed your Vision and Hearing Screening bus. I joked with him that he needed to get his hearing checked, laughing about his "selective deafness." Your volunteers were very pleasant, and while my husband was having his hearing tested the other volunteer asked if I would like to be tested while I was waiting. I said "why not" and did the screening.

My husband's screening showed mild hearing loss but mine showed a moderate to severe hearing loss. Your volunteer suggested that it may be a good idea to see a hearing professional for further testing.

I made appointments with a local audiologist, and my husband did indeed have a small hearing loss but not serious enough for intervention.

My hearing loss was much more profound and I was told that I would need a hearing aid in both ears! I guess the signs had been there for quite a while but I had not paid attention. Little things like my sister mentioning a squeak in my car that I did not hear or my friends always telling me when my cell phone was ringing.

I got my hearing aids on Monday and what a huge difference it is making in my life! There are so many things I did not realize that I was no longer hearing. I thought that hearing loss meant that you needed to "turn up the volume." I didn't know that you could lose certain sounds and ranges.

I cannot thank your organization and your volunteers enough for providing this service. If that bus had not been at the State Fair and your volunteers had not been so welcoming I would have probably not realized that I had a very real problem.
