Changes to the MD22 Constitution and By-Laws

Two resolutions were proposed and passed to change the MD22 Constitution and By-Laws.

The first, a change to the Multiple District Constitution, clarified the process and timeline for selection of future MD22 Convention sites. It also revised the timeframe for planning future Conventions from 5 years to 3 years out. There was also a small change to the By-Laws. The purpose of the amendment was to eliminate the two-year requirement for the appointment of the Multiple District Administrative Assistant.





Five Ways to Make Serving Fun

If you aren't having fun, then you're doing it wrong," says Lion Melissa Murphy of the Sandwell Lions in England.

Service will always be the main focus of Lions, but since our inception in 1917, being a Lion has always involved having a good time too. What better way to keep people coming back to serve than to make sure serving is fun?

Here are five ways to inject some good humor and good times into your club activities.

1. **Get to know your members.** When you know your members well, you know what makes them laugh. Delmont Lions in Pennsylvania include a little get-to-know-you during their meetings. The club president picks a member at random and puts them in the interview seat, asking them about their interests, hobbies and experiences. "It's actually a lot of fun hearing members talk about themselves, especially the older folks," says Delmont Lion Lisa Gismondi.
2. **Be willing to change things up.** It's good to make some changes when something isn't working for your club. Maryah Tucker of the Bay Area Special Olympics Lions Club says, "We got tired of having a board meeting and then the following week a general meeting with the same 14 people. So now we only have one meeting, and instead of what would have been our general meeting, we have an activity or event with the special needs community. We do things like dances, movie nights, craft nights and game nights. It's been a game-changer!"
3. **Make new traditions.** Sure - pancake breakfasts are great, but doing something new and unique with your club can be a great way to mix it up. On Halloween, Sandwell Lions have a tradition of going out for curry after dressing up and volunteering at the local spooky trail. And there's definitely something fun about a bunch of witches and warlocks gathering for a post-scare meal. Murphy says that they were even asked to pose for photos with other restaurant-goers this year.
4. **Challenge one another.** Push yourselves with spirited contests and set goals with fun rewards. Charles Carter of the Dawsonville Lions Club in Georgia walked away with a pint of strawberries after he told a great joke at one meeting. His club has been running a joke contest to get the laughs going. "We draw three names out of a hat and ask them to tell a joke. The best joke wins a prize, donated by a member and placed in a paper bag. One meeting a Lion won two tickets and VIP parking for an NFL game."
5. **Encourage silliness.** Whether it's goofy costumes at a fundraiser or theme nights for club meetings, look for ways to show that Lions take their work seriously, but they never take themselves too seriously. Lions Mike Eisenberg and James Knight dressed up as Tweedle Dee and Tweedle Dum at the 2022 28-U District Convention in Utah and wandered the crowd, calling fellow Lions' cell phones to see whose would ring—then taking the opportunity to fine them for having their phone on. "They also had bags full of funny prizes and many very bad jokes," says Lion Richard Stevenson. But their antics worked, and the crowd was engaged and having a blast. One feisty crowd member even swiped Tweedle Dee's own cell phone and auctioned it off, forcing him to pay US\$40 to get it back.



However you decide to add a little spark to your Lion events, remember that you can do a whole lot of good while having a whole lot of good times.

Some of the objectives of the Foundation are to:


- Develop, establish, promote and maintain a program of youth services in MD22 through the Lions clubs of the Multiple District.

The Kusiak Lions Youth Foundation (LYF) is not as well-known as some of our other Lions Organizations. This Foundation was established in 2004 as a result of the generosity of our Past International President Clement F. Kusiak and we will soon be celebrating 20 Years of service to our youth in Multiple District 22.

LYF's **primary** objective is to develop, establish, promote, and maintain a program of youth services in MD 22 through the Lions Clubs of Multiple District 22. It is accomplished by providing matching grants for the service activities of a Lions Club involving youth. It has to be a special project for youth, not an annual event that your club has been doing for years. The project must be managed by a Lions Club, which means that the Lions must be active participants in the project. There are so many opportunities for a Lions Club to partner with a youth organization in the community such as Leo Club, Boy Scout or Girl Scout Troop, Boys & Girls Club, 4H Club, Reading Youth Group in a Library, Volunteer Club etc.

Some of the past matching grant awardees are:

- Severn River Lions Club and Cub Scout Pack 688 Project of obtaining a Trailer for the Pack
- Salisbury Lions Club's Leo Club participation in Wreaths Across America project in Arlington National Cemetery
- Salisbury P.R.I.D.E. Lions Club's youth seminar on "Breaking the Chains-Prisons and Gangs"
- Lexington Park Lions Club's obtaining sporting goods for Lions Camp Merrick
- Darlington Lions Club's Community Leo Club purchasing Plus-Optic equipment for vision screening
- Carroll County Lions Clubs ask kids to Roar Like a Lion activities in the Libraries.

We cannot find a better way to involve our youths in the community in service activities and develop our next generations of service-oriented citizens. There is an old saying, "**We cannot always build the future for our youth, but we can build our youth for the future.**"

DIABETES MINUTE

WAYS TO KEEP YOUR HEART HEALTHY

Smoking, High Blood Pressure, and High Cholesterol

The three biggest risk factors for heart disease are smoking, high blood pressure (hypertension), and high blood cholesterol. Luckily, there are things you can do to keep your heart as healthy as possible!



“Stop Smoking for Your Heart”

Smoking harms your blood vessels by making them thicker and narrower so that it’s harder for your heart to pump blood around your body. Smoking also makes your blood sticky and thick, so it forms clots more easily. This raises your risk of having a stroke.

It’s not easy to quit smoking—but you can do it! To learn more, review the Ready, Set, Quit! handout provided by your coach.

Monitor Salt and Your Blood Pressure

Salt (sodium) is important for keeping the right balance of fluid in your body. However, too much salt can be a problem for some people. When there is too much sodium in your blood, it pulls water into your blood vessels, which raises your blood pressure. Eating too much salt can cause obvious effects, like swollen feet. If your shoes are pinching more than normal, it might be time to look at your diet.
