District Governor's Message

Welcome to a new Lions year. If my name sounds familiar, it's because I'm District Governor again, this time without the challenges of a pandemic. Unlike four years ago, when meetings were held via Zoom or not at all, I plan to visit each club at least once between now and the end of June 2025, and preferably sooner.

Throughout the year, I'll focus on my motto, "Legacy & Passion - Serving Together." This motto reminds us of our Lions' past as we enthusiastically serve our communities today. Even several years removed, many are still rebounding from the pandemic that upended life as we knew it. This is partly reflected by District 22-A having 22 clubs today, down from 26 in 2020. This decline is not unique to Lions but common among service organizations nationwide.

Our shared goal is to first maintain our current membership, as we did this past year, and then to grow Lions here in District 22-A, contributing to the worldwide membership goal of 1.5 million by July 1, 2027. This is an ambitious target, and those of us in District 22-A are working to do our part. Immediate Past District Governor John Mosier, who now serves as both Global Membership Team and Global Extension Team coordinator, exemplifies this effort. These two areas mesh well together. John worked extremely hard on membership during his tenure as Governor and, as anyone who speaks with him knows, he has a great passion for service.

Our district goals for this year are identical: a net growth of 100 new members, the creation of two new clubs, and having 84 percent of clubs reporting service activities through the Portal. That last point is significant. You might ask why not aim for 100 percent of clubs reporting service, and I agree. However, 84 percent is a substantial improvement over the current number of clubs reporting service activities.

I am absolutely certain that every club in District 22-A is serving its community. The challenge is to report those activities on the Portal, which I know can be a new and daunting task. Having been a club secretary, I've experienced the Portal on both good and bad days. Nonetheless, I believe that by working together, we can navigate the technology and make it work for us.




ABERDEEN LIONS HIGHLIGHTS








Lion Phil Raub Receives Melvin Jones Award


75th Year Charter Night Celebration

KEEP YOUR HEART HEALTHY

If you are at risk for type 2 diabetes, you are more likely to have problems with your heart or arteries. So, it's important to keep your heart healthy.

TIPS:

- —When possible, replace unhealthy fats with healthier fats.
- —Remember that all fats are high in calories use them moderately.
- -Choose less processed meats, poultry, fish, and dairy more often. Processed foods like readymade meats that are breaded or in sauces often contain more fat, salt, and sugar.
- -Choose leaner cuts of meat, like round cuts and sirloin.
- -Remove the skin from chicken and turkey and eat more fish.
- -Try using herbs and spices to flavor foods to lower the amount of salt.
