District Governor's Message

Thanks to everyone who attended our District 22-A social this month. I heard from many Lions there that they enjoyed the evening. That is a tribute to PDG Sue Parks, First VDG Suzette Kettenhofen and Cabinet Secretary Sandy Guzewich who pitched in to do all the hard work. My job was to stay out of their way and follow instructions, which for the most part I did.



Also, thanks to them for the surprise Melvin Jones Fellow presentation that I assure you was a surprise and did not see coming. I accept the award as recognition of what we have done and will continue to do as a district.

There are a couple of takeaways from our social and the District 22-W social last month. They come under the umbrella that we're all in this together. Our guest speaker from Kansas told me that as he travels through his home district – 250 miles in one direction and 150 miles in another – that he drives along stretches of roads and passes one town after another where there used to be a Lions Club. That has a familiar ring for what we see in our district and throughout Multiple District 22. We can feel a bit of relief that, as of the beginning of November, our District 22-A membership numbers are holding steady, and the rest of our multiple district is doing well overall. Yet, from Kansas to Maryland and Delaware, there is work to be done to reverse membership declines.

At our Council of Governors meeting after the District 22-W social, the guest speaker from Arizona noted that her home district struggles to get more than 40 percent of clubs to report service activities. Again, that sounds familiar, although our service reporting is better but not great.

When people face challenges, experts suggest going after "the low-hanging fruit." Tackle the easy stuff first. Reporting service is the easy stuff. You already did the tough work of giving time and effort doing service. Now spend a few minutes recording what you did for Lions Clubs International and, more importantly, for the rest of the world to see.

Point them to your webpage and let what we do come to life for them. By fixing service reporting and giving it an extra kick on social media, we can resolve one issue – the low-hanging fruit – and be well on the way to see gains in new members that all of us really need.

LASH EYEGLASSES SORTING

Thirty-two people from 14 Lions Clubs sorted and boxed 18,000 pairs of eyeglasses at the October 12th LASH Eyeglasses Sorting Event. A total of 46 boxes of eyeglasses with at least 350 per box were collected and sorted. Some boxes had over 400. There were also 1,000 wrap-around sunglasses that will go to missionaries to take to Africa and other countries, and one box of about 500 broken frames that will be recycled. The money from the recycled eyeglasses frames and the titanium and gold frames will come to LASH. That money will help pay for eyeglasses and hearing aids for applicants within Baltimore City, where we have no Lions Clubs to help provide funds.

There were about 500 cellphones and 100 sets of hearing aids collected. The cellphones will go to a veterans organization that will recycle them for money for projects for active duty military and veterans. One thing they buy is phone cards for troops overseas to be able to call home.

The hearing aids will go to the Towson University Hearing & Balance Center, where LASH sends approved hearing aid applicants to get their hearing aids. Some of the donated hearing aids are disassembled for demonstration in audiology PhD classes. The newer ones in better condition are refurbished and issued to clients who cannot otherwise afford hearing aids. One hearing aid assistance applicant this year is an 84 year old concert pianist, who graduated from Peabody and has her masters degree in music education. Part of her income comes from performing at events. Her old hearing aids have failed and she cannot hear well enough to perform until she gets replacements. A set of donated upper level hearing aids are being refurbished for her, so she can better hear the nuances of sound in the range of music, so she can perform again. She is so excited and grateful to be able to play again. That's what Lionism is all about.

Thanks so much to Eyeglasses Sorting Chairman, Joe Livingston, for another well-organized event and for handling the shipping of all the eyeglasses and cellphones.

Help "Give Back" to the Disabled Students who Sort Lions' Used Eyeglasses

People know we Lions collect used eyeglasses. For many years used glasses collected in the Multiple Districts ultimately have been given for free to indigent needy people in vision clinics that I established in California and Mexico over the past 18 years.

I'm Lion Bob Martin, and I've been a District Sight Conservation Eyeglasses Recycling Chairman for many years in Districts 22-W and 22-C. I joined Lions over 22 years ago. As my wife and I moved, I've belonged to Clubs in Middletown, Myersville, Freedom District, and Sandy Spring.

After Lions collect donated glasses, I am the person to whom they go. Those glasses are sorted to determine their re-usability, then counted, packed, and boxed for eventual shipment to clinics.

Since 2001, our used glasses have been sorted at no cost or expense to Lions by SUCCESS students in Frederick, MD. SUCCESS is a 3-year Frederick County Public School-sponsored job and life skills training program for 18–21-year-old young people with disabilities.

I've worked with SUCCESS students for 23 years as the program grew from 5 students to 66 this year. These students have performed tens of thousands of free volunteer community service work hours for Lions. They know their efforts are important and that their contributions are "helping others."

Over the past few years, I have invited Santa Claus to visit the students at a party just before the winter holidays. As a part of the celebration, I give each student a small cash "Thank You Gift". The first year it was a \$10 dollars bill. That year, one student opened his envelope, raised his bill in the air, and excitedly yelled "I'm rich! I'm rich!" I thought he was being funny. Then I realized – sadly – that he was not!

Since then, each student has received a \$30 cash "gift" from me/us for their work. The money has been donated by me, my friends, family, and Lions Clubs throughout the Districts. It all goes to the students and the SUCCESS Program.

I hope your Lions District, Club or members will send me a donation in *any amount* before early December. Santa's already "scheduled," and I can't wait to be his helper again this year!
