


From the District Governor

Dear Lions,

Over 10,000 Lions from around the globe gathered in Orlando for the annual Lions Clubs International Convention July 14-17, 2025.

International President A P Singh's motto is "Lead to Serve, Serve to Lead." He has asked that his pin not





A highlight was marching proudly in the International Parade of Nations with 35 Multiple District 22 Lions. We District Governor-Elects were honored to carry the MD-22 banners as the rest of the marchers followed our lead and chanted promoting the Lions Clubs International Convention

in Washington, D.C., set for 2027. The spirited chants drew cheers from spectators and fellow Lions alike, putting the nation's capital firmly on the global Lions map.

The convention also featured a powerful keynote from Olympic legend Michael Phelps, who inspired the crowd with his message of perseverance, mental health advocacy and community service. His words resonated deeply with the Lions' mission of service and compassion.

One of the most moving moments came during the International Flag Ceremony, where the flags of all nations represented in Lions Clubs were presented with pride and pageantry, underscoring the global unity of the organization.

Camaraderie continued into the evening as only invited members attended a lively celebration hosted by the German Lions. With music, German Food and beer, and international fellowship, the party was a testament to the friendships that flourish across borders in the Lions community.

For me, the convention was made even more special when my mother, who was attending her first Lions Convention, pulled the ribbon to officially signify my installation as District Governor — a moment filled with pride, joy and family love.

From parade chants to international celebrations, my time in Orlando was more than just a convention — it was a celebration of service, leadership and global friendship, setting the stage for an exciting year ahead.

Then on Saturday, July 26th we held the Multiple District turnover at the Maryland School for the Blind. This year's council — made up of four women and one man — is going with the theme "Four Roses and a Thorn." Districts



A-D are the Roses and District W is the Thorn. Each member was given a pin that has either a Rose with their district letter or a Thorn bush on their letter. Staying with the Garden theme of Growing our Multiple District, our Council Chair was made the Gardener and was presented with a pair of gardening gloves with roses on them and a gardening tools pin. Our Administrative Assistant was designated as a Carnation and presented with a pin of a bunch of carnations in the shape of an A.

On Aug. 9th we had our first Cabinet meeting of the year at the Maryland School of the Blind. IPDG Jim presented end-of-the-year awards to the clubs, I explained my motto "Vision of a Brighter Future" and introduced my cabinet members, giving the jacket emblem badges to my Cabinet Secretary and Treasurer.

The International President's special services initiatives were also discussed (see below). We also talked about Service Reporting on the Portal, this year's Peace Poster Theme "Together as One," and that Posters need to be brought to the Oct. 25 meeting as judging will be at my Social on Nov. 1. I announced the special training incentive for attending the USA/Canada Leadership forum in Atlantic City on Sept. 18-20. Lion members could receive a portion of their registration fees back if they agreed to do one of three things:

- Write a news article for InSights talking about what they learned by attending the forum and how they are going to use it in their club.
- Take lots of photos and write about their experiences for websites and Social Media pages.
- Do up to a five-minute presentation at our Oct. 25 cabinet meeting of what our district can do.

Note: First-time attendees to the USA/Canada leadership forum will receive back more of their registration fees, while returning Lions will receive a smaller payout. We will be limiting the reimbursement to the first five who submit their request and how they are going to share their experience. If enough money is left from what we put aside, then we will do the next five members, and continue until the money allotted is used. All reimbursement will be issued at the Oct. 25 Cabinet Meeting. The form for reimbursement will be on the District's website shortly, but you can always email me at lions22a@gmail.com to let me know your intent.

Leader Dog Bark, Brew and Wine Fetches Funds



PERRY HALL / KINGSVILLE LIONS District 22-A's Leader Dog Bark, Brew and Wine in May raised almost \$14,000 for the organization that empowers people who are blind or visually impaired with lifelong skills for safe and independent daily travel. Upon receiving the donation, Leader Dog sent this letter to the district:

Thank you for being one of our strongest partners and helping us raise funds for Leader Dog. As we start the new fiscal year, I wanted to share an update that I hope you can celebrate and share with your district.

In fiscal year 2024-25, Leader Dogs for the Blind served 323 clients. Of those, two clients were from MD-22, and over the past 85 years Lions have helped us serve 207 people from MD-22 at zero cost to them! We received donations from 16 Lions Clubs from MD-22-A, amounting to \$18,209.25. Together, MD-22 had four Top Dog Clubs. All clubs helped us raise \$141,395.18.

In fiscal year 2024-25 Lions Clubs both nationally and internationally helped raise over \$2.2 million for Leader Dogs for the Blind, serving around 1,400 individuals. This new fiscal year we are hopeful to serve even more people who are blind or have low vision and have a goal to raise \$2.5 million.

With your continued support, we can help more clients. It is because of your unwavering support that, together, we can serve so many people. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to reach out, and let me know how we can partner in this new year and work together to reach more clients and help them be unstoppable.
